Introduction to the questionnaire

OBJECTIVE OF THE SURVEY

This questionnaire aims to collect information for an overview study by Milieu Consulting to support the European Commission in assessing progress of the implementation of the new EU Forest Strategy 2030. SUPPORTING THE SOCIO-ECONOMIC FUNCTIONS OF FORESTS FOR THRIVING RURAL AREAS AND BOOSTING FOREST-BASED BIO-ECONOMY WITHIN SUSTAINABILITY BOUNDARIES

Promoting circular economy, sustainable forest bioeconomy for long-lived wood products

1. *Is the cascading principle¹ and the circular economy approach, optimising the use of wood, implemented in your Member State / Organisation?*

In which sectors and how is the cascading principle implemented?

The cascading use principle and the circular economy approach are only partially implemented across the EU but not yet in a sufficiently harmonised or effective way. Implementation remains fragmented, with considerable differences between Member States and sectors. In many cases, policies and subsidies prioritising energy generation from biomass still compete with material uses of wood, which undermines circularity objectives and the efficient use of resources.

For the wood-based panels industry, full application of the cascading principle is essential. Panels extend the lifespan of carbon stored in wood by decades and enable further recycling at the end of product life, thereby maximising both environmental and economic value. However, a lack of consistent enforcement of the principle across EU energy, waste legislations and the bioeconomy often results in high-quality post-consumer wood being diverted prematurely to energy recovery rather than recycled into new materials.

To optimise the use of wood, EU and national frameworks should ensure that biomass is used first for long-lived, high-value material applications and only subsequently for energy recovery when no other use is feasible. This requires coherence between renewable energy policies (notably RED III), waste legislation, product standards and public procurement rules. Stronger incentives for collection, sorting and recycling of wood waste, combined with harmonised EU standards for recycled wood, are key to operationalising the cascading principle.

In summary, while the concept is recognised at EU level, its implementation remains inconsistent. A stronger, binding and cross-sectoral application is vital to deliver a truly circular and resource-efficient circular bioeconomy.

Several national and regional initiatives across Europe actively promote the use of wood in construction, though their scope and ambition vary significantly between Member States. A coherent EU-wide framework recognising the carbon storage and substitution benefits of wood

¹ The cascading principle was already enshrined in the EU Forest Strategy 2014-2020. Under this principle, wood is used in the following order of priorities: 1) wood-based products, 2) extending their service life, 3) re-use, 4) recycling, 5) bio-energy and 6) disposal.

construction, integrated into building legislation, the Energy Performance of Buildings Directive and green public procurement, would significantly strengthen these efforts and accelerate the transition towards climate-neutral, circular buildings.

Moreover, these initiatives should also promote wood-based off-site modular construction, which allows rapid, high-quality and low-carbon building assembly while minimising waste and emissions. This approach aligns with circular economy principles by optimising resource efficiency and facilitating reuse or recycling at end of life.

The sustainability criteria for bioenergy under RED III are applied to varying degrees across Member States, but their linkage with national financial schemes remains inconsistent. In several cases, bioenergy still benefits from subsidies or support mechanisms that do not fully reflect the cascading use principle or carbon efficiency.

It is essential to further strengthen sustainability criteria for bioenergy to ensure that support measures align with EU climate and circular economy objectives. Public funding should be directed only to bioenergy sources that truly deliver additional greenhouse gas savings and do not compete with high-value material uses of biomass.

In particular, subsidies for the early combustion of quality wood, which could otherwise be used for durable material applications such as wood-based panels, should be phased out. Maintaining such incentives risks distorting markets, increasing carbon opportunity costs, and undermining resource efficiency.

Moreover, strengthening monitoring, reporting, and verification mechanisms would also improve transparency and prevent double counting or misuse of primary biomass.

In summary, aligning national financial support with stricter sustainability criteria and phasing out subsidies for unsustainable bioenergy pathways are necessary steps to ensure a genuinely circular and climate-effective bioeconomy.

The European Panel Federation (EPF) contributes actively to the implementation of the EU Forest Strategy (EUFS) by representing Europe's wood-based panels industry, a key enabler of the circular bioeconomy and sustainable forest value chains.

EPF promotes the cascading use of wood, ensuring that harvested timber is used first for long-lived, high-value material applications (such as packaging, furniture and buildings) before energy recovery. This approach maximises carbon storage, resource efficiency, and substitution effects, directly supporting the EUFS objectives on sustainable forest management, carbon neutrality, and circularity.

EPF also fosters wood recycling and the development of a Single Market for secondary raw materials, coordinating with EU institutions and standardisation bodies to remove regulatory barriers and harmonise acceptance criteria for post-consumer wood. Through its participation in EU-funded projects such as *EcoReFibre* and *CISUFLO*, EPF advances innovation in wood fibre recovery, circular design, and life-cycle optimisation.

Furthermore, EPF provides data, policy input and advocacy to ensure that EU policies (including RED III, CRCF, the update of the Bioeconomy Strategy and the forthcoming Circular Economy Act) reflect the material and climate value of wood-based products. The federation also works closely with partners across the forest-based value chain to promote coherent implementation of the EUFS.

EPF fully supports the objective of ensuring that Europe's forests contribute to a sustainable and climate-neutral economy while safeguarding biodiversity, ecosystem resilience, and the multifunctional role of forests.

EPF believes that sustainable forest management is important for achieving these goals. Active management ensures forest regeneration, health, and adaptation to climate change, while enabling a continuous supply of renewable raw materials. Properly managed forests deliver multiple ecosystem services (including carbon storage, biodiversity, water regulation, recreation) alongside wood production for circular, low-carbon renewable materials.

EPF's members transform sustainably sourced wood into long-lived products such as particleboard, MDF, OSB and fibreboard, which store carbon for decades and substitute carbon-intensive materials in construction, furniture and packaging. This contributes directly to EU climate neutrality and resource efficiency. By promoting wood recycling and secondary raw material use, EPF extends the life of forest carbon and reduces pressure on primary resources.

EPF also advocates for policy coherence between forest, climate, energy, and circular economy

legislation, to ensure that the cascading use of biomass is respected and that wood is prioritised for high-value material uses before energy recovery. In addition, EPF supports innovation and R&I projects improving circularity, waste reduction, and sustainable sourcing practices.

Achieving the EU Forest Strategy objectives by 2030 requires the full implementation of the cascading use principle and the phasing-out of subsidies for bioenergy that compete with material uses of wood. It is essential to ensure that the growing and increasingly diversified demand for woody biomass, including for new uses such as bioenergy, biochemicals, or bioplastics, does not undermine feedstock (including industrial by-products) availability for traditional material uses. Long-lived material products such as wood-based panels deliver superior carbon storage and resource efficiency benefits and serve as stable value-added demand drivers within the bioeconomy

The importance of strengthening circularity is further underlined by the EPF policy paper "[Strategic Wood Availability](#)", which shows that Europe faces a growing structural gap between future wood demand and sustainable domestic supply. The study highlights that without a significant increase in recycling, reuse, and efficient cascading use, rising pressure from multiple competing sectors will exacerbate shortages and undermine both climate and industrial objectives. Reinforcing circularity is therefore essential not only for resource efficiency but also to secure long-term wood availability for high-value material uses, including wood-based panels.

- *the name of a self-employed individual (natural persons) on whose behalf the respondent is contributing,*
- *personal data included in the response or contribution to the targeted consultation activity, including (personal) opinions,*

Furthermore, you may spontaneously provide other, non-requested personal data in the context of your reply to the targeted consultation.

5. How long do we keep your personal data?

The Data Controller and Data Processor only keeps your personal data for the time necessary to fulfil the purpose of collection or further processing.

For each of the categories of personal data that may be processed, please find below the retention details and the reference to the relevant record of processing:

- Personal data related to targeted consultation activities (including surveys, interviews and focus groups) will be kept for no more than **5 years** after the closure of the file. For more information see the record reference [DPR-EC-01011.4](#)
- Personal data shared with the controller for future mailing purposes (e.g., for receiving newsletters or invitations to similar events) are processed in line with the Record of Processing DPR-EC-03928 (Management of subscriptions to receive information) and the specific privacy statement prepared by the organising Commission service.
- Personal data shared with the controller for the purpose of the contact list to be published on the Commission's website will be kept for **3 years**.

6. How do we protect and safeguard your personal data?

All personal data in electronic format (e-mails, documents, databases, uploaded batches of data, etc.) are stored on the servers of the Commission and Milieu Consulting SRL. All processing operations are carried out pursuant to [Commission Decision \(EU, Euratom\) 2017/46](#) of 10 January 2017 on the security of communication and information systems in the European Commission.

In order to protect your personal data, the Commission has put in place a number of technical and organisational measures. Technical measures include appropriate actions to address online security, risk of data loss, alteration of data or unauthorised access, taking into consideration the risk presented by the processing and the nature of the personal data being processed. Organisational measures include restricting access to the personal data solely to authorised persons with a legitimate need to know for the purposes of this processing operation.

The Commission's processor, Milieu Consulting SRL, is bound by a specific contractual clause for any processing operations of your personal data on behalf of the Commission. The processor has to put in place appropriate technical and organisational measures to ensure the level of security, required by the Commission.

7. Who has access to your personal data and to whom is it disclosed?

Access to your personal data is provided to the Commission staff responsible for carrying out this processing operation and to other authorised Commission staff according to the "need to know" principle. Such staff abide by statutory, and when required, additional confidentiality agreements.

Cookies (if they are used, this will be explained in the specific privacy statement of the survey programme used for this consultation)

Cookies are short text files stored on a user's device (such as a computer, tablet or phone) by a website. Cookies are used for the technical functioning of a website (functional cookies) or for gathering statistics (analytical cookies).

Enabling these cookies is not strictly necessary for the website to work but it will provide you with a better browsing experience. You can delete or block these cookies, but if you do that, some features of the meeting/event website may not work as intended.

8. What are your rights and how can you exercise them?

You have specific rights as a 'data subject' under Chapter III (Articles 14-25) of Regulation (EU) 2018/1725, in particular the right to access, your personal data and to rectify them in case your personal data are inaccurate or incomplete. Where applicable, you have the right to erase your personal data, to restrict the processing of your personal data, to object to the processing, and the right to data portability.

You have the right to object to the processing of your personal data, which is lawfully carried out pursuant to Article 5(1)(a) of Regulation (EU) 2018/1725 on grounds relating to your particular situation.

The Commission will ensure that the data subjects can exercise their right to object to processing whenever possible by the organisers of the meeting/event (on the spot, by attending the meeting without turning on their camera; or ex-post, by deleting a specific sequence from the online video/voice recording).

You can exercise your rights by contacting the data controller, or in case of conflict the Data Protection Officer. If necessary, you can also address the European Data Protection Supervisor. Their contact information is given under Heading 9 below.
